## One Year Anniversary of Her Passing: August 4, 2015

On the anniversary of her death, her husband, Edward, wanted to remind the readers of the News-Ledger about the difference that Sharl had made to City of West Sacramento during her 63 years as a resident. Her life was celebrated by friends and family at the Horizon Christian Fellowship on Manzanita Way in West Sacramento on August 12, 2015.

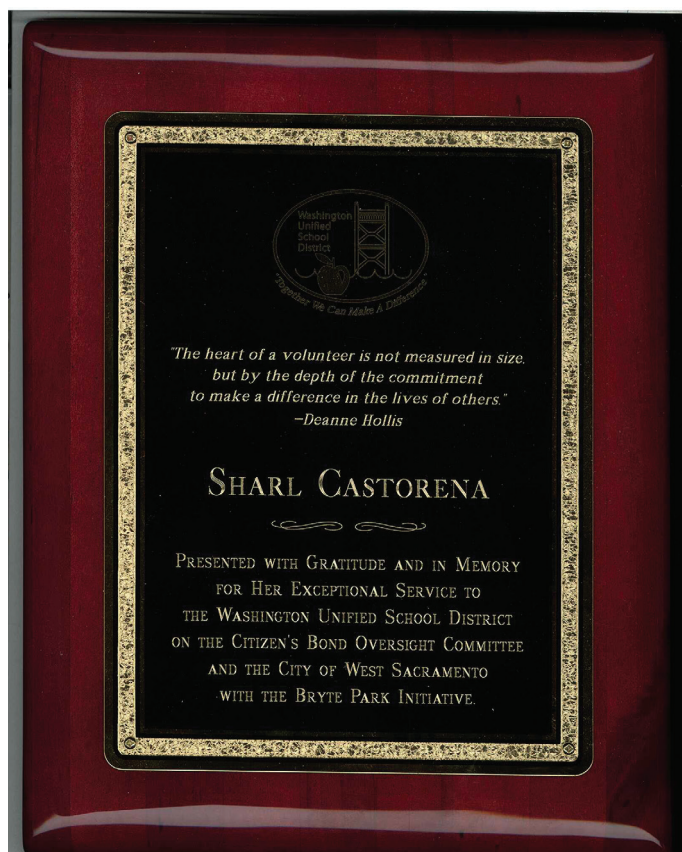
Her family moved to West Sacramento over sixty years ago, coming from Arkansas, where she was born on March 11, 1951. Her family members included her husband, Edward, and her daughters, Lora Luera (Robert), Amber Castorena, Chaylena Castorena (Brent), and son, Joseph Castorena.

Her granddaughters are Lydia Tupasi (Jeremy), Jessica Lovato (Daisy), Michelle Garcia (Juan),

and Alicia Luera. And her great grandchildren are Analeigha, Jasmine, Marleigh, and Justin. Her brother, Wayne Adams (Linda) and her sister Dorothy Blaylock (Don) all miss Sharl's smile and wonderful attitude and dedication to her community.

As a member of the Latino Community in West Sacramento, Sharl noticed firsthand the effects of discrimination in her city. She got involved when her granddaughter was pulled over by the West Sacramento Police Department more times than she could count. She was working in the Washington District and was driving home to Broderick. There were no citations issued. There were no reasons given to her as to why she was stopped. Sharl needed to find out why this was happening. She felt that there was discrimination involved in the police action.

When Measure V was proposed, Sharl served on the oversight com-



mittee. This initiative was a district bond issue for the Washington School District. She also worked with the 2 x 2 Committee for the Washington School District. During that time a grant was funded to improve conditions on

the bathrooms in Bryte Park. As the President of the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) she worked with the local elected officials to acquire funding from Disney for im-

## Yolo County Fair kicks off with 10th annual tasting event

The 10th annual Yolo County Fair Opening Night Gala on Wednesday, Aug. 17 will kick off the 2016 Yolo County Fair and celebrate agriculture products and produce inside the Ag Building at the Yolo County Fairgrounds in Woodland.

The tasting event, which usually attracts approximately 600 attendees from all over the region, will take place from 6 to 8 p.m. and feature approximately 36 vendors, live music, leaders from the local community, previous guests and presenters from past fairs and more, according to a statement by the Gala's event coordinator Samantha Novan.

"It's a wonderful event and a great opportunity to experience all of the local produce and wine and beer and olive oil that's produced here in Yolo County that you might not experience anywhere else under the same roof," said Novan.

Tickets run \$20 in advance and \$25 at the door, but the event's organizers urge attendees to buy their tickets early as they tend to sell out before the event. Novan said tickets are available online for the first time this year and can be purchased at [www.yolocountyfair.net](http://www.yolocountyfair.net) under "The Fair" section by clicking on "Yolo County Fair's Opening Night Gala." Note that a \$3 processing fee is added to online ticket purchases.

Event organizers like Yolo County Fair Board President Katie Villegas are especially excited about community members being able to get a taste of local products.

"It's the best event in Yolo County!" said Villegas. "Showcasing all of our locally-grown produce and locally-made craft beers, wines, cheeses and olive oils – it's a delicious experience for the whole family!"

Two local bands, Chicken & Dumpling and Clarence Van Hook & Friends, are back this year to perform live blues

# FRAUD ALERT: Vehicle Purchase Scams

Yolo County District Attorney Jeff Reisig is warning Yolo County residents about making vehicle purchases online. Scammers lure individuals by posting advertisements of vehicles with prices that are considerably under market value. In addition to these low prices, the scammers often also offer to ship the vehicle to the buyer at no extra cost and ask buyers to wire them the payment for the vehicle. Buyers send the money, then they are unable to contact the “seller.” The vehicle is never delivered to them. The scammers frequently claim that the purchase is being conducted via a third party company such as eBay or Craigslist and that eBay’s Vehicle Purchase Protection Plan applies to the sale. However, the scammers do not actually conduct the “sale” through these third party companies. The Yolo County

District Attorney’s Office urges you to always independently confirm the sale through the third party company and to research all information provided by the seller before buying a vehicle through eBay or Craigslist. Be cautious of the following red flags: 1) Payment methods that require the buyer to wire money, especially through MoneyGram, Western Union or Green Dot MoneyPak cards; 2) Vehicles with considerably low price tags and sellers who offer to ship the vehicles at no extra cost; 3) Sellers who do not allow prospective buyers to inspect the vehicle in person before sending money. A common claim by the seller is that they live overseas and therefore cannot meet with the prospective buyer. If purchasing a vehicle on eBay or Craigslist, pay by credit card

whenever possible so that you can challenge the charge if necessary. Additionally, either ask to inspect the vehicle in person before sending money or consider providing the payment at the time that you pick up the vehicle. It is always wise to arrange a meeting place in a public location or at your local police department, as legitimate sellers often require you to pick up the vehicle yourself or hire a shipping company. # August Exhibition at YoloArts’ Gallery 625: Color Matters: The Art of David Wiley

The August exhibition at Gallery 625 will feature the art work of Sacramento to artist, David Wiley, who will be presenting recent works in watercolor and gouache, alongside his original poetry.

Wiley was born in Kansas, and moved to Sacramento in 1987, having established himself as a full time painter ever since. He is a graduate of the University of Kansas and has studied painting in Mexico and Spain. Widely traveled, he has exhibited throughout California and abroad including France, Mexico, Spain and Ethiopia. Wiley has published two volumes of poetry: Designs for a Utopian Zoo (1992) and The Face of Creation (1996). This year, he published a children’s book, The Gypsy Geese. He has participated in many art exhibitions in the area, throughout California, and in France, Mexico, Spain, and Ethiopia.

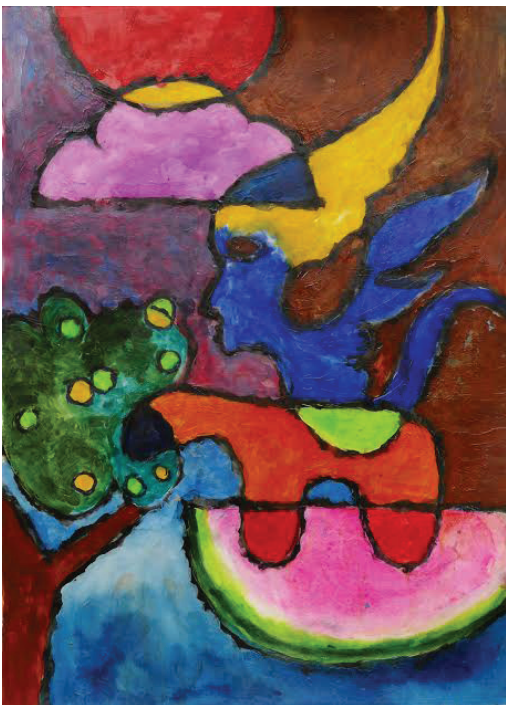
“What makes this exhibit particularly remarkable is that David’s eyesight has been failing for the last several years, yet he remains as prolific as ever,” said Janice Purnell, curator of Gallery 625. “in fact, most of the work in the show has been created in the last year.”

Wiley reports life as a painter is different now with his failing eyesight.

“It’s harder to do, and it has changed my approach somewhat. There are a lot of solid areas of color and I have a bolder style now than I did before,” Wiley recently stated.

In his artist statement for the show Wiley says, “For me, color is at the heart of painting, and over the years I have grown to think of color as a language or at least a complex form of communication. The Fauvists held the revolutionary belief that color, itself, could be the subject of a painting, which led to new ways of thinking about color and all that it represents. Color is still a mystery, and perhaps always will be, but I feel compelled, as an artist and a human being, to explore this puzzle and to recognize whatever it is hiding in the light.”

Samples of Wiley’s poetry will be exhibited along with his vibrant watercolor and guache paintings.

# Kurt Fishback: Nature Mandalas at Gallery 1855

Gallery 1855 (820 Pole Line Road, Davis, CA 95618) is pleased to announce the solo exhibition “Nature Mandalas” by renowned photographer Kurt Fishback. The exhibition will run throughout the month of August. A special artist reception will be held Sunday, Aug. 14 and will include a special talk by the artist from 1-1:30 p.m.

From the Indian language Sanskrit meaning Sacred circle, Mandalas are gateways to our divinity, the God within us from the human perspective and inspired by energy inherent in the earth and nature.

A mandala can be used during meditation as an object for focusing attention. The symmetry of the designs tends to draw the attention towards their center, towards our center.

In each Mandala natural elements have been incorporated from photographs made while walking on the Earth. Some of the elements include; trees, stones, grass, sand, water, air, clouds and sky. Light is the most important element, indicative of the energetic life force in everything.

Visages of animal and other spirits emerge in the production of the mandalas as a result of the juxtaposition of the natural elements used. They speak of our connection to the Sky Nation and to the individual medicines of Grandfather Sun, Grandmother Moon, the Thunder Beings, the Cloud People, all planets, galaxies, stars and so-

lar systems.

These Mandalas were made as a part of my daily spiritual practice. Each mandala is available for individual interpretation and discovery of any personal meaning specific to the individual viewer.

Kurt Edward Fishback, son of photographer Glen Fishback and name sake of photographer Edward Weston, grew up as part of the photographic community in Northern California during the 1940s and ‘50s. Mentors and friends of the family included Ansel Adams, Wynn Bullock, and Edward Weston. Despite his immersion in the world of photography, Fishback began his artistic career studying ceramic sculpture at Sacramento City College, the San Francisco Art Institute and the University of California, Davis in the ‘60s. He first began to experiment with photography in 1962 as a way to document his experiences with other sculptors, but it was not until 1973, when his father invited him to teach at the Glen Fishback School of Photography, that photography became Fishback’s primary mode of expression. Since then he has gathered over 250 environmental portraits of artists in their studios or the space they chose.

Kurt continues to teach photography when he is not too busy maintaining his own artistic career. His first major, one-person exhibit was held at the San Francisco Museum of Modern art in 1982. Besides this Kurt has amassed an exhibition record of over 100 solo exhibitions and countless group exhibitions since 1961. Additional information can be found at www.daviscemetery.org

provements.

She and her husband worked for two years to get the faucet repaired and clean water for the children to drink.
